The Catalyst program for high school students at Ciudad Nueva is a college and career readiness program designed to give students exposure to different career options by meeting professionals from various career paths. They learn about the educational requirements for different career paths and then practice soft skills, such as research and interview skills, in the classroom.

The goal of the program is to help students see a different vision for their futures and help them gain college, career, and most importantly life skills.

260 families received 57,643 lbs of food donated to Ciudad Nueva's Food Co-op. Here the co-op receives produce and non-perishables from local grocers that is overstock or slightly blemished from businesses like Food City, Quality Produce, Novotex and Jardin de Milagros. Members of the co-op sort and equally distribute food to it's members twice a week to ensure our families are being fed.

YOUTH

In 2019 our youth programs served a total of 175 students for 23 hours/week along with a total of 11 Catalyst participants.

Ciudad Nueva served 5,898 meals during after-school programs and youth events!

Ciudad Nueva also had 82 students participate in Upward Soccer and sent 56 students to various camps across the country.

FAMILIES

Along with youth programs, we made 25 home visits, including connecting families to job assistance and/or referrals, community programs, emergency assistance, post-high school education enrollment, and household items. 5 Families participated in the Christmas Store, 3 Community Dinners were hosted for program where we served over 55 meals between the three events.

COMMUNITY

Ciudad Nueva's annual Spring Fest brought in 300 attendees and was the result of hard work from 4 non-profits and 7 churches who collaborated on the event.

There were also 13 Downtown Church Connection attendees, which was put together by 41 organizers from 11 non-profits. There was a total of 187 enrolled individuals from 66 non-profits and 27 churches.

Ciudad Nueva also began hosting coding and digital literacy classes in all youth programs, as well as, a Reading Plus program in LaunchPad and Kid's Create

GIFTS IN KIND

In 2019, we leveraged over \$180,000 of gifts in kind! Donated goods, services, and volunteer hours helped make Ciudad Nueva dreams a reality!



Many of our students volunteered to help with asylum seekers at churches and organizations with food prep, sleeping area prep, as well as translation. They were out picking up trash in the neighborhood, filling Christmas stockings for an organization that works with families in Juarez, assisting in prepping, serving and cleaning up at community dinners, volunteering with Spring Fest and Enchilada Fundraiser and other fundraisers, and volunteering with the Upward Soccer program.

ONWARD & FORWARD







We have often been asked over the last 15 years about what motivates our community development work in our beloved Rio Grande community. What motivates our work is that we are called to love our neighbors, especially when the need is great.

Community Stats:

Education: 46% of adults do not have a high school diploma or GED, 77% of children are considered to be at-risk of not completing high school.

Income: The median household income is \$15,526/year for program participants, and 24% of households earn under \$10,000/year Housing: 78% of residents are renters, 58% live in rental units with only one bedroom or no bedroom

Transportation: 35% have no access to a vehicle, there is no major grocery store within walking distance

Family: 82% of children are born to unmarried women, births to teenage moms is more than double the national average, 67% of children under 5 live under the poverty line. At Ciudad Nueva we envision an alternate future than what the statistics depict. We want to interrupt cycles of poverty. We aspire to cultivate hope and an environment where kids, families and the community are empowered to move toward a successful future. In the beginning we started walking alongside 10 third graders. 15 years later we are working with hundreds of neighbors as we empower youth, support families, strengthen community and equip leaders.
